ANNUAL REVIEW REPORT FOR 2022

In so far as our journal has been under re-evaluation, we have received many good pieces of advice. Following them, we have changed the interface of our web site, edited our Guidelines and Article template, reduced the volume of future articles and specified the branches of linguistics to better fit the team of editors and reviewers. We have also refreshed their publication lists and added Researcher profile links to their Contact data. Our journal is now registered by the Ministry of Culture of the Slovak Republic with the license number EV 26/22/EPP, which we added to our web site. As the University of SS Cyril and Methodius in Trnava, our publisher, updated its logo we have also updated ours.




Figure 1. Received, published and declined articles during the period of 2016–2022. Source: Own processing

The interest in our journal remains stable and the number of articles we received last year is approximately identical to that of 2021 – 46 articles (47 in 2021), but the number of rejected articles is lower (46%) as compared to 72% in 2021. It does not mean that we work less. It means that our potential authors understand that we only accept papers of the highest quality for consideration. This year I have decided to visualize the number of the accepted and declined articles in the form of a graph (see Fig. 1).




Figure 2. Declined articles in % during 2016-2022 (per each year and in total). Source: Own processing

I will not explain once again why so many articles have been rejected. You may find the explanation in my report for 2021, but the reasons are the same. I have a feeling that some people read neither our Guidelines, nor our published articles and then send us articles out of scope of our journal or translated versions of their previous publications in their native language. The dynamics of growth in declined articles can be seen in Fig. 2.

We see here that by the end of 2022 – beginning of 2023 we had 35,658 visitors from 136 countries. The top seven countries whose people visited us on January 1, 2023 can be seen in Fig. 4.

In 2021, we had 28,363 visitors from 127 countries. We had over 7,000 visitors more in 2022 and 9 new countries (see Fig. 5) and 35,658 visitors from 136 countries in total as of December 31, 2022.




Figure 6. Visitors to our web site from different American states and regions of the Czech Republic.




Figure 7. The map of our site visitors in December 2022. Source: Lege artis site; own processing

Using the map of visitors is very informative and shows the panorama of our readers. Now I can state that we have visitors from all continents but one – Antarctica (see Fig. 7).




Figure 9. The list of our authors' locations in 2022. Source: Lege artis site; own processing

If you click on the arrow, you will see the list of the cities, countries and educational establishments our authors come from (see Fig. 9).




Figure 10. University of Education, Winneba, Ghana. Source: Lege artis site; own processing

Clicking on the city will open a nice photo of the university where our authors work (see Fig. 10).

In Figure 11 we see the interest in our June issue.




Figure 12. Visitors to our web site in July 2022. Source: Lege artis site; own processing




Figure 13. Visitors to our web site in July 2022. Source: Google Analytics




Figure 14. Visitors to our web site in November 2022. Source: Lege artis site; own processing

We uploaded the last issue on December 5 and the activity of our readers in November can be explained by the interest in our journal in general, not by the interest to each definite issue (see Fig. 14).




Fig. 15. Citations of Lege artis in Web of Science in December 2022. Source: Web of Science site




Figure 16. Publications and citations of *Lege artis* presented in Web of Science in 2022. Source: Web of Science site

For any journal, contact with major scholars is very important. No less important is the citation of the published articles in reputable databases (see Figs. 15 and 16).

The following authors occupy the top ten positions in the Web of Science list for *Lege Artis* (see Fig. 17).


